The Indiana State Library has announced that Indiana Memory has an all-new website design. The updated look includes improved search functionality in addition to the integrating the State Library's Internet Archive and Hoosier State Chronicles collections right on the homepage.

Indiana Memory is a collaborative effort to provide access to the wealth of primary sources in Indiana libraries, archives, museums and other cultural institutions. It is a gateway to Indiana's history and culture found in digitized books, manuscripts, photographs, newspapers, maps and other media. As a portal to the collections, Indiana Memory assists individuals to locate materials relevant to their interests and to better appreciate the connections between those materials.

Indiana Memory is made possible through grant funding from the Institute of Museum and Library Services to the Indiana State Library under the provisions of the Library Services and Technology Act.

The State Library's Internet Archive is a collection of Indiana government publications from the Indiana State Library Indiana collection. The publications record the activities of the official

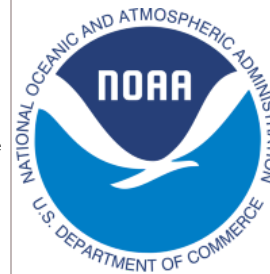

The mission of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration extends "from the surface of the sun to the depths of the ocean floor." The agency plays a vital role in setting international policies that address oceans, fisheries, climate, space and weather. It has at hand vessels, satellites, science centers, laboratories and an array of experts to deep dive into the natural world and shape the understanding of it.

[NOAA.gov](#), however, is not only a science clearinghouse but also a fun site to visit. On its pages, one can view satellite imagery of earth; watch video of the blue whale breaching; or study photographs from the bottom of the ocean, be they the wreckage of the R.M.S. Titanic or a fish navigating coral in the Marianas Trench National Monument Park. One can discover the mysteries of the great kelp forests, which are harvested for use in toothpaste, shampoo, pudding, salad dressing and even some pharmaceuticals, while learning how

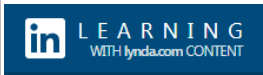

North Webster Community Public Library and NWCC hosting Skydome Planetarium in March



The North Webster Community Public Library, in collaboration with the North Webster Community Center, has announced an upcoming Skydome Planetarium event scheduled for Saturday, March 30. The educational experience will take place at the North Webster Community Center gymnasium, and promises to be a day of celestial exploration and educational entertainment for all ages.

Those in attendance will have the opportunity to immerse themselves in 45-minute planetarium shows at five different times throughout the day – 9 a.m., 10 a.m., 11 a.m., 1 p.m. and 2 p.m. The shows will delve into the mysteries of the solar system and constellations, and provide valuable insights into the upcoming solar eclipse.

Admission to the planetarium shows is free of charge, but due to limited seating, tickets are required. Tickets can be picked up at the North Webster Community Public Library while supplies last. Demand is expected to be high, so those interested should consider securing tickets early to ensure a seat. The North Webster Community Center is located at 301 N. Main St. in North Webster.

The data collected at NOAA are often updated in real time. Data can be used in school projects or to answer such questions as "What is the hottest month on record?," which will yield the answer, "July 2023." Graphs and maps are also available on climate and weather. One can also consult charts to explore safe passage along the nation's coastline.
